Tackle Sustainability in Critical Care

One of the recent meeting's key discussions focused on staff resistance to change. The NHS-wide "Gloves Off" campaign, aiming to reduce unnecessary glove use, highlights this challenge. Ingrained habits can be difficult to break.

The group hopes to tackle this


Education and Awareness: Providing staff with resources on:

Network Occupational Therapists Form Working Group to Champion Upper Limb Positioning

The Network is proud to announce the launch of a new working group dedicated to optimizing upper limb positioning for patients across our network. This crucial initiative is spearheaded by the Occupational Therapist group in the network. Leigh Connors, who is the Team Lead Occupational Therapist (Critical Care) at Darent Valley Hospital reports that working group aims to develop comprehensive guidance for all member facilities.

Why Upper Limb Positioning Matters:

Proper positioning of the upper limbs plays a critical role in patient care, recovery, and long-term well-being. It can significantly impact:

- Functional Use: Ensuring optimal positioning helps patients maintain or regain as much functional use of their hands and arms as possible. This can improve independence in daily activities and enhance quality of life.
- Skin Integrity: Incorrect positioning can lead to pressure injuries and other skin complications. The working group will focus on strategies to prevent these issues.
- Pain Management: Proper positioning can help alleviate discomfort and promote a more comfortable recovery experience for patients.

The working group are committed to:

- Developing Evidence-Based Guidelines: The group will gather and analyse current research to create a comprehensive set of best practices for upper limb positioning.

Leigh shares a summary of what the working group hope to achieve below:

Aim: Our primary goal is to ensure optimal functional use and care for patients' hands and upper limbs.

Key Focus Areas and Actions:

Creation of Informative Resources:

Lucy is capturing photos illustrating various hand and upper limb positions, including static hand positioning, grasp, and up-and-down movements. These visuals will serve as valuable reference materials for nursing staff, promoting consistent and appropriate positioning practices.

Development of Patient Engagement Tools:

Fraser is leading the drafting of an "I Can Do" board, aiming to empower patients by highlighting their current abilities, goals, and aspirations. This initiative aims to enhance patient autonomy and motivation throughout their rehabilitation journey.

Exploration of Neuromuscular Stimulation:

During our discussions, the potential use of neuromuscular stimulation was explored as a complementary approach to upper limb rehabilitation.

Overall, our working group remains committed to advancing best practices in upper limb care within the critical care setting. By equipping healthcare professionals with valuable resources and patient-centered tools, we strive to optimize patient outcomes and experiences.

Network launches Patient Safety Initiative for Passy-Muir Valves

Exciting news to promote patient safety! The Network has established a working group dedicated to ensuring the safe use of Passy-Muir Valves (PMVs) across our Network. The Network recognises the importance of providing consistent guidance across all member units. Led by Georgina Linstead, this group will develop valuable resources and guidance to benefit everyone. The working group is diligently exploring best practices and crafting resources. Georgina shares insights below

"The PMV Working Group was initiated after Frimley Park Hospital shared an SI from 2023 & learning around the use of Passy-Muir Valve in-line with mechanical ventilation. It was identified that there is variation in practice both regionally & nationally with very little specific guidance. The Working Group has representation from Critical Care Nurses, Practice Development, Physiotherapists & Speech & Language Therapists & is developing a regional benchmarking survey & fact-finding exercise which will also be extended to national special interest groups. The aim of this is to establish current practice, themes surrounding safety aspects, training needs, available educational resources & accepted best practice. The hope is from that we can develop/ utilise a Network-wide consensus re: key safety aspects of this therapeutic intervention & educational resources to support staff."

The Network will keep you updated on their progress and share the valuable information they develop in future issues of this newsletter.

UKCCNA Workforce Optimisation Plan and staffing standards 2024-2027

The UKCCNA Critical Care Nursing Workforce Optimisation Plan and Staffing Standards 2024-2027 are officially launched.

Critical Care Nursing Workforce Optimisation Plan and Staffing Standards 2024-2027



This three-year workforce optimisation plan (2024-2027) provides evidence-based standards for critical care registered nurse staffing. It provides the case for change, with a framework to support career development and a sustainable model for staffing, in order to improve nurse retention.

There are several areas addressed:

- Adoption of Critical Care staffing standards
- Implementation of the Adult Critical Care Nursing Career Pathway
- Education minimum standards (including numbers of clinical nurse educators)
- Restorative supervision (through roles such as the professional nurse advocate)
- The role of the wider associate / support staff group
- Regular review of staffing establishments incorporating increased unavailability of registered nurses to deliver safe patient care

The standards in nurse staffing chapter in the new version of GPICS which will be out later in the year will also mirror the content in this document.

We expect that this document will help provide the stability to ensure the future of critical care nursing in the UK.
