Network Annual Conference October 4th

The recent Kent, Surrey and Sussex Adult Critical Care, Operating Delivery Network Critical Care Conference was a resounding success, thanks to the enthusiastic participation of over 150 delegates. We extend our sincere gratitude to everyone who attended and contributed to the event's lively discussions and valuable insights.

The conference featured a diverse range of presentations covering a variety of critical care topics. Some of the highlights included:

- Refractory Hypoxaemia: A comprehensive overview of the physiology, management strategies, and challenges associated with refractory hypoxaemia.
- One Way Valve Working Group: Updates on the progress of the ODN OWV working group, including their collaboration with national organizations and the development of a new competency for critical care staff.
- Follow-Up and Rehabilitation: A presentation by the East Kent Hospitals Follow-up and Rehabilitation team on their services and the positive impact they have on patient outcomes.
- End-of-Life Care: A qualitative study exploring the experiences of critical care staff in providing endof-life care, including the emotional impact and the need for further training and support.

- Martha's Rule and Call for Concern: An overview of the implementation of Martha's Rule at Medway NHS Trust and the challenges faced.
- Frailty Admissions: A panel discussion on the complexities of frailty admissions in critical care, including ethical considerations and resource allocation.
- The Check Out Campaign: A presentation on the Check Out Campaign, which aims to raise awareness of the psychological impact of trauma on healthcare staff and encourage them to seek support.



New South East Region Adult Critical Care Transfer Service (ACCTS)

Starting October 1st, 2024, the Southeast Region will launch a new permanent, funded ACCTS. This service will be hosted and delivered within the region for the first time, providing crucial support to critical care patients across Thames Valley and Wessex (TVW) and Kent, Surrey, and Sussex (KSS).

Key Points:

- Host Trusts: Buckinghamshire Healthcare NHS Trust (BHT) and Royal Surrey NHS Foundation Trust (RSFT) will host the ACCTS for their respective areas.
- Delivery Partners: South Central Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trust (SCAS) and South East Coast Ambulance Service Foundation Trust (SECAmb) will work with the host trusts to deliver the service.
- Service Name: The new service will be known as ARCC TVW in TVW and ARCC KSS in KSS.
- Continuity of Care: ARCC TVW will continue with minimal changes, while ARCC KSS will maintain its current operations.
- Referrals: Referrals will continue to be directed to the Single Point of Contact (SPOC) via phone or Refer-a-patient webpage.
- Service Expansion: ARCC KSS plans to expand its services in the future, including establishing new transfer hubs, recruiting additional staff, and investing in new equipment.

Collaboration and Support:

We look forward to working with all stakeholders in this exciting new chapter of ACCTS. We will provide regular updates on the service's development and strive to deliver an excellent standard of care to all critical care patients in the Southeast region.

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Important Update: Sepsis Research Priorities Launched

The ICS are pleased to announce the launch of the Sepsis Research FEAT and James Lind Alliance's top ten research priorities for sepsis treatment. This significant achievement is the result of a two-year collaboration involving 1,744 patients, carers, and family members.

Key Findings:

- Patient-Centered Approach: The research priorities were developed through a collaborative process that centered on the experiences and perspectives of those affected by sepsis.
- Shaping the Future of Sepsis Research: These priorities will play a crucial role in guiding future research efforts and improving outcomes for sepsis patients.

Publication in The Lancet:

The full report detailing the top ten research priorities has been published in The Lancet.

Sharing the Findings:

We encourage you to share these findings with your units to raise awareness and drive positive change in sepsis diagnosis, treatment, and longterm outcomes. By spreading the word, we can collectively work towards improving the lives of patients affected by sepsis. Read more <u>here</u>

Key Updates from the Network's September Clinical Forum

1. ODN Network Visits: Progress is being made on network visits, with completion expected by November. Draft reports have been sent to units for feedback.

2. Winter Surge Plans: Units are encouraged to submit their updated winter surge plans for network records.

3. Digitalization of Competencies: The funding for the digitalization project has been extended until March 2025, providing an opportunity for units to implement the steps competency on the digital platform at no cost.

4. ACC Census: The census is now scheduled for February 2025 and will be followed by data analysis.

5. Subgroup Updates: Several subgroups, including ACCPs, Psychology, and One-Way Valve working group, are actively working on various projects and initiatives

6. NHS Futures Platform: The ODN has established an NHS Futures workspace for collaboration and information sharing among members. Units staff are encouraged to join the NHS Futures site via this link KSS ACC ODN NHS Future site.

7. Transfer Service Update: The new Southeast Region Adult Critical Care Transfer Service (ACCTS) contracts have been signed, with Royal Surrey NHS Foundation Trust as the host trust for Kent, Surrey, and Sussex, and Buckinghamshire Healthcare NHS Trust as the host trust for Thames Valley and Wessex. The recruitment process for the operational lead and nurse lead positions is underway, with the aim of establishing the transfer team and implementing necessary governance structures and protocols. The SPOC remains operational 24/7 for all critical care transfers

8. Network-Wide Issues reported from units:

- Staffing Shortages: Several units are experiencing staffing shortages, particularly for band 5 and band 6 roles.
- Violence and Aggression: Incidents of violence and aggression against staff are increasing, highlighting the need for improved safety measures and training.
- Psychological Support: There is a growing recognition of the importance of psychological support for both patients and staff in critical care settings
- Patient Flow: Units are experiencing challenges with patient flow, including delayed discharges and high acuity patients.
- Mental Health Patients: The care of patients with mental health conditions in critical care settings remains a complex and challenging issue

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Quality Improvement and Research Projects in units across the Network.

Projects underway or completed at Kent and Canterbury Adult Critical Care Unit

- Eyecare
- Bowel care/protocol
- Patients weight on admission
- Safe Transfer of the Patient (STOP handover tool)
- Patient sleep pattern (nocte)
- Mouthcare reviewing practice as it stands

Projects which are planned or underway at William Harvey Adult Critical Care Unit

- QI-Kerro-Pro pressure relieving tape for use with NIV masks. Aim to reduce the number of nasal bridge pressure sores.
- QI-Planned- Adhesive remover to reduce the incidence of skin tears from dressing removals.
- QI-Planned- Adhesive antimicrobial glue to replace bio-patches. Aim to reduce incidence of lines being pulled out and reduce infiltration incidences.
- QI-Extravasation surveillance programme- New Trust guidelines being implemented for the identification and management of extravasation injuries.
- Research-Due to start a randomised control trial of Stryker mouthcare packs verses standard mouth care for the reduction in VAP rates.
- Research- Two portfolio studies due to close in November which has allowed involvement in 'CoReCCT' platform.
- Research- Green light given to academic study looking at post intensive care syndrome (Collaborative project with University of Kent and Canterbury Christ Church University).
- QI-NG fixation dressing trial to prevent pressure damage (trial completed and product identified to be implemented in the Trust)

Summary of BACCN Conference

Key Themes and Takeaways

The recent BACCN conference in Aberdeen, attended by the Quality Improvement Lead for the network, provided valuable insights into the current state and future direction of critical care nursing. Key themes explored at the event included:

- Nursing Profession Advancement: Professor Aisha Holloway emphasized the potential for nurses to disrupt traditional healthcare practices and drive improvements in patient safety and professional recognition.
- Global Healthcare Delivery: UK-MED's work in conflict and disaster zones highlighted the importance of adaptable and resilient healthcare systems.
- Paediatric Critical Care Collaboration: The need for improved collaboration between paediatric and adult critical care units to enhance outcomes for children transitioning to adult care was discussed.
- Nurse Identity and Advocacy: A panel discussion explored strategies for promoting the nursing profession in the UK through mentoring, role modelling, patient safety, and advocacy.
- Patient Safety in Adult Critical Care: The Patient Safety Commissioner emphasized the importance of implementing effective patient safety measures in adult critical care units.

Diverse Presentations and Networking Opportunities

The conference featured a wide range of presentations covering various aspects of critical care nursing practice, including:

- Clinical Practice: CCOT, practice education, rehabilitation, and critical care audits
- Technology: Clinical informatics
- Research: Nursing research including Patient and |Public involvement

- Fundamental Technical Skills: ECG analysis, Tracheostomy care and vascular access skills

Important Update: ACC Census Postponed to Early 2025

There is an important update regarding the Adult Critical Care (ACC) Census (formerly known as the ACC stocktake).

Postponement until Early 2025:

Following careful consideration and in recognition of the current pressures faced by critical care units during the winter period, the ACC Census has been postponed. The new launch window is now planned for February/March 2025. This revised timeframe aims to provide units with additional breathing room to focus on day-to-day operations and ensure sufficient time for data collection and reporting.

Benefits of the Delay:

- Reduced Winter Workload: By shifting the census to early 2025, the NHSE team aims to alleviate the burden on critical care staff during the historically demanding winter months. This allows you to prioritize patient care during this busy time.
- Improved Data Collection: With a more spacious timeframe, units will have the opportunity to dedicate more time and resources to comprehensive data collection and reporting, ensuring the accuracy and quality of the data submitted.

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Intensive Care Society Updates

ICU Society Statement on COVID-19 Inquiry

The Intensive Care Society (ICS) recently presented evidence to the COVID-19 Inquiry, highlighting the significant challenges faced by healthcare systems during the pandemic. The Society's testimony emphasized the critical role of healthcare professionals and the need for improved resources and support.

Key Points from the Evidence:

- Workforce Challenges: The pandemic exacerbated long-standing shortages in the critical care workforce, highlighting the need for improved recruitment and retention strategies.
- Increased Capacity: The Inquiry underscored the need for increased intensive and enhanced care beds to meet the demands of future pandemics and other healthcare emergencies.
- Decision Support Frameworks: The importance of decision support frameworks, such as CRITCON and Adult Critical Care Transfer, for managing patient flow and allocating resources was emphasized.
- Oxygen Provision: The Inquiry examined the challenges associated with oxygen provision and the limitations of equipment during the pandemic.
- Rehabilitation: The critical role of rehabilitation in supporting patients' recovery from COVID-19 was highlighted.
- PPE and Psychological Support: The Inquiry addressed the challenges related to personal protective equipment (PPE) and psychological support for healthcare workers.

The ICS's Recommendations:

The ICS submitted a comprehensive written evidence document to the Inquiry, outlining its recommendations for improving critical care services. These recommendations include:

- Investing in the Workforce: Increasing funding for critical care workforce development and retention.
- Expanding Capacity: Increasing the number of intensive and enhanced care beds.
- Improving Decision Support: Enhancing decision support frameworks and tools.
- Ensuring Adequate Oxygen Supply: Investing in oxygen infrastructure and ensuring a reliable supply.
- Prioritizing Rehabilitation: Integrating rehabilitation services into critical care pathways.
- Supporting Healthcare Workers: Providing adequate PPE, psychological support, and other resources to support healthcare workers.

The ICS is committed to ensuring that the lessons learned from the pandemic are implemented to improve critical care services for future generations. The evidence session is available online here.
